INTRODUCTION TO BIO2Q RESEARCH

Series #8: Dr. Haowei Li Postdoctoral Fellow, Bio-2 Core

How can we restore lost neural function and decode the emergence of higher intelligence in the human brain? Our research explores these questions by uncovering the molecular logic that governs synaptic connectivity and plasticity across the gut-brain axis, spinal cord, and brain organoids.

By mapping the distribution and regulation of the synaptic organizer Cbln2 in enteric and central circuits, we aim to clarify how peripheral central networks and communicate and adapt. Building on these insights, we use the synthetic synaptic organizer protein CPTX to repair damaged excitatory circuits and promote axonal sprouting after spinal cord injury, with improved motor readouts in preclinical models. In parallel, we apply CPTX to human iPSC-derived brain organoids to test whether enhanced synapses and longrange axons may drive the emergence of working memory and higher-order functions.

Through these efforts, we strive to advance fundamental neuroscience and future translational therapies for neurological disorders and injuries.



I studied clinical laboratory science at university and have worked as technical staff in university laboratories for approximately 10 years in the fields of molecular immunopathology, biology, nephrology/hematology, and molecular glucose metabolism control.

My main experimental skills are as follows: siRNA/DNA plasmid transfection,

experience in mammalian cell culture techniques including SDS PAGE and Western blotting, genetic analysis, mouse colony maintenance, breeding, husbandry, drug administration (oral, intraperitoneal, subcutaneous, and intravenous), tissue dissection, organ harvesting, cell culture, immunohistochemical analysis, ELISA, and HPLC etc. Currently, I assist with the passaging of organoids and iPS cells, assist with colony stocking of gut bacteria, and perform laboratory maintenance tasks.

Bio2Q PRESENTS AT KEIO **UNIVERSITY'S MITA-KAI ALUMNI HOMECOMING DAY**




